Desert Water Agency Regular Board Meeting Minutes 03/05/19

President Stuart called for approval of the February 19, 2019 Special Board meeting minutes. He noted a correction that Mr. Baker was in attendance at this meeting.

Approval of 02/19/19 **Special Board Minutes**

Secretary-Treasurer Ewing moved for approval, noting the correction. After a second by Director Cioffi, the minutes were approved as written.

18373. President Stuart called upon General Manager Krause to Report provide an update on Agency operations.

General Manager's

Mr. Krause provided an update on Agency operations and noted his meetings and activities for the past several weeks.

18374. President Stuart noted the minutes for the February 28, 2019 Executive Committee were provided in the Board's packet.

Committee Reports: Executive 02/28/19

18375. President Stuart opened the meeting for public comment.

Public Comment

Deiter Crawford stated that district elections would provide Deiter Crawford more representation for working class and fixed income residents. He then offered assistance with drawing the division maps.

There being no one else from the public wishing to address the Board, President Stuart closed the public comment period.

18376. President Stuart called upon Assistant General Manager Johnson to present staff's request for Acceptance of Work for the 2017-2018 Replacement Pipelines project.

Action Items: Request Acceptance of Work/2017-18 Replacement Pipelines

Mr. Johnson stated that the 2017-2018 Capital Improvement Budget included Work Order No. 17-111 for installation of replacement pipelines in the amount of \$4,005,743.72. The Engineer's estimate was \$2,933,000. The original contract was for \$3,195,525. There were three change orders that brought the final contract amount to \$3,465,563.73. In November 2018, Board approved a budget augmentation for \$450,000 to cover costs associated with the addition of Michelle Road and Debbie Drive pipeline installations. The final budget amount of \$4,005,743.72 includes the augmentation and transfer of Conservation and 2016/2017 Replacement Pipeline funds. All project work was performed by Borden Excavating, Inc., which included a total of 16,002 linear feet of 8" and 12" ductile iron pipe. Staff recommends the Board accept said work in the amount of \$3,465,563.72. Subsequent to Board acceptance, a Notice of Completion will be filed and the Agency will make final payment to Borden Excavating, Inc. Thereafter, following the lien period, the Agency will release retained funds to Borden Excavating, Inc. He then acknowledged Maya Lopez, Staff Engineer on her work for this project.

Secretary-Treasurer Ewing made a motion to approve staff's recommendation. After a second by Director Cioffi, the motion carried unanimously.

Action Items: (Cont.) Request Acceptance of Work/2017-18 Replacement Pipelines

18377. President Stuart called upon General Manager Krause to present staff's request for Board Action Regarding Claim for Damages Filed by Brandon Akers.

Request Board Action Regarding Claim for Damages/Brandon Akers

Mr. Krause stated Mr. Akers claims on February 6 while his plumber turned the water off, the pipe leaked due to corrosion and claims the Agency did not take proper care or service causing the leak. He is seeking \$738.75; the amount the Agency charged his account to repair the broken service. Staff requests that the Board deny the claim and forward to ACWAJPIA for their handling.

Director Cioffi made a motion to approve staff's recommendation. After a second by Secretary-Treasurer Ewing, the motion carried unanimously.

18378. President Stuart called upon Agency Counsel Riddell to provide a report on the February 21, 2019 Board of Directors of the State Water Contractors meeting.

Discussion Items: 02/21/19 SWC Mtg.

Mr. Riddell provided a report on the following items: 1) Closed Session, 2) Board Actions, 3) Business Process Objectives Update, 4) SWP Operations Report; and 5) Draft Budget.

18379. President Stuart asked Finance Director Krieger to present his report on the Annual reporting of back-up facility and capacity charges.

Annual Reporting of Back-Up Facility & Capacity Charges

Mr. Krieger stated that summaries are provided for the back-up facility and capacity charges the Agency collects when a new service connection is made to the water distribution, reclaimed or sewer systems. He explained since capital expenditures exceed the fees collected, legal counsel has indicated annual reporting is not necessary. However, it is prudent to continue apprising the Board. He noted that a copy of this report was sent to Building Industry Association (BIA) and Desert Valley Builders Association (DVBA), which they approved the analysis and agreed with the report.

18380. President Stuart noted that Board packets included Outreach & Conservation reports for February 2019 and asked Mrs. Metzger for any updates.

Outreach & Conservation – February 2019

Mrs. Metzger stated that she, General Manager Krause and Vice President Bloomer will be meeting this Friday with Assemblymember Garcia. She reminded everyone about the Agency's Butterfly Block Party on March 9. The Agency's facilities tour has tentatively been rescheduled for April 23.

Vice President Bloomer noted her attendance at the Annual 18381. Washington, DC ACWA conference where she met with legislators and their staff.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT MARCH 19, 2019

Butterfly Block Party

The 2nd Annual Butterfly Block Party was held on Saturday, March 9 in the Agency's front parking lot. About 300 people attended the event, which not only showcased our pollinator garden and wall art, but also included many fun activities for the entire family. There was chalk art, face painting, live music and performers, snacks, crafts and informational booths (Desert Water Agency, Children's Discovery Museum of the Desert, Palm Springs High School Sustainable Garden Club, Desert Horticultural Society, City of Palm Springs Sustainability and Milkweed for Monarchs).





Public Water System Order to Sample for PFOA/ PFOS

On March 12, 2019 the Agency received an Order from the State Water Resources Control Board Division of Drinking Water to sample for Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA)/Perfluorooctanesulfonic Acid (PFOS). PFOA/PFOS have become an increasing concern due to the tendency to accumulate in groundwater and during the Third Unregulated Contamination Monitoring Rule (UCMR III) sampling program that occurred from 2013 to 2015 more than 12,000 drinking water samples were collected for these constituents by large water systems (systems serving over 10,000 people).

A known source of PFOA/PFOS is aqueous film forming foams (AFFF) used for fire suppression at airports. The Desert Water Agency has been ordered to sample for PFOA/PFOS because the Palm Springs airport is listed as an airport that has used these foams. Starting June 2019, the Agency will be required to sample fourteen wells once each calendar quarter for a minimum of four quarters. We anticipate the cost of each sample will be approximately \$300 to \$400 per sample, for a total per quarter of approximately \$4,200 to \$5,600.

In July 2018, the State Water Board established a notification level for PFOA at 0.000014 mg/L (14 ppt) and a level for PFOS at 0.000013 mg/L (13 ppt). If laboratory analysis detects the presence of PFOA and/or PFOS in any sample above the notification level, the Agency will be required to conduct a confirmation sample. If the confirmation sample is positive, the State will take the average of the tests to determine if greater than the notification level. If the average exceeds the notification level, the Agency must then notify the public. If the average is below the notification level, then no notification is required. If the confirmation sample is zero, the Agency will be required to take one more confirmation sample. If that is also zero, then no notification is required. The Agency will also not need to notify if the Agency submits testing results that show blending water from a positive well with another source does not exceed notification levels.

MWD COLORADO RIVER AQUEDUCT - Desert Region

<u>Summary – March 11, 2019</u>

The 2019 CRA Shutdown continues with all work on schedule at this time. The Surge Chambers Bypass Covers contractor is progressing steadily. Canal scraping and tunnel cleaning are underway at various locations along the Aqueduct. Staff continue to support contractor work and perform preventative and corrective maintenance tasks.



Minutes Conservation & Public Affairs Committee Meeting

March 13, 2019

1. Discussion Items

A. Toilet Rebate Budget –

The Committee elected to augment the FY 2018/19 budget for toilets in the amount of \$20,000 given that funds are currently exhausted. The additional amount would come from budgets for other conservation programs (which are all under budget).

B. Rebates Outside of Retail Service Area

The Committee determined that they would like to offer water conservation rebates throughout Desert Water Agency's statutory boundaries. The Committee directed staff to develop communications to announce the availability of rebates.

C. <u>Desert Landscape Changes</u>

Staff informed the Committee that program changes would be proposed for the next fiscal year, likely to include rebates for grass in private yard areas. General Manager Krause informed the Committee that he was looking into the cost effectiveness of turf removal compared to water purchases.

D. <u>Election by Division Outreach</u>


RE: REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION TO CALL FOR BIDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF 2018/2019 REPLACEMENT PIPELINES (LIVMOR AVE, AIRLANE DR, SYBIL RD, MORSUN CIR, EASMOR CIR, PLAIMOR AVE, N CAHUILLA RD, E HERMOSA PL, CANYON PL, MERITO PL, W HERMOSA PL, MISSION RD, S CAHUILLA RD, CHINO DR, PRESCOTT DR, MOUNTAIN VIEW PL, VIA MIRALESTE, CHIA RD, THE PALMS ST)

The 2018/2019 Capital Improvement Budget includes Work Order No. 18-160 for replacement pipelines (approximately 15,650 linear feet of 8" ductile iron pipe and 900 linear feet of 12" ductile iron pipe). The budget amount for the work order is \$3,950,000, to include engineering, construction, inspection, and overhead costs. The Engineer's construction cost estimate for the project is \$3,410,000, with an estimated inspection cost of \$200,000 and estimated Agency labor cost of \$310,000.

The attached map shows the location(s) for the replacement pipelines within several streets throughout the Palm Springs area. All of the pipelines have exhibited several leak occurrences over the past couple of years, are unlined steel mains, and have an average age of 72 years.

With authorization being granted today, the bid opening for the project will tentatively be held on April 30, 2019 with the Contract award scheduled for the meeting of the Board of Directors on May 21, 2019. Work is expected to commence in June 2019, with completion expected in late November 2019.





STAFF REPORT TO DESERT WATER AGENCY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

RE: REQUEST BOARD AUTHORIZATION FOR GENERAL MANAGER TO BEGIN PROCEDURES TO SELL AGENCY SURPLUS LAND APN 504-133-003 and APN 504-133-004

When the Desert Water Agency acquired the Whitewater Mutual Water Company, the final purchase included several parcels of land located within the City of Palm Springs that allowed the Whitewater Mutual Water Company to construct transmission pipelines through the City limits from the north end of Palm Springs to the south side, ending at the O'Donnell Golf Course. The pipelines within these parcels have been decommissioned and are no longer used by the Agency. Within the past year, there have been parties interested in purchasing some of these parcels. Two such parcels are located between Dominguez Road and Cabrillo Road, north of Racquet Club Drive and west of Indian Canyon Drive (Attachments 1 and 2). The parcels are shown on Tract Map 19447 as Lot 3 and Lot 4 (Attachment 3).

Management has reviewed the need for the above mentioned parcels and have determined that there is no beneficial use for the Agency to keep the properties and would like to explore selling them to interested parties. The land, however, is considered surplus land. As defined in Government Code Section 54221, surplus land means land owned by a local agency, which is determined to be no longer necessary for the agency's use, except property being held by the agency for the purpose of exchange. Land that is exempt from surplus status is land that is less than 5,000 S.F., less than the minimum legal residential building lot size for the jurisdiction in which the parcel is located, or 5,000 S.F. in area, whichever is less, or has no record access and is less than 10,000 S.F. in area; and is not contiguous to land owned by the state or local agency that is used for park, recreational, open-space, or low and moderate income housing purposes; and is located neither within an enterprise zone pursuant to Section 7073 nor a designated program area as defined in Section 7082 of the Government Code. Since both parcels are larger than 10,000 square feet and are not exempt from surplus status, certain statutory requirements must be satisfied before the properties can be sold, as follows:

1. Written notice that the property is available for purchase must be provided to the City of Palm Springs to give the City an opportunity to purchase the property for the development of low and moderate income housing. (Government Code Section 54222), (Attachment 4).


- 2. Written notice of the availability of the property for purchase or lease for park and recreational purposes or open space purposes must also be mailed to (a) the County Department of Parks and Recreation, (b) the regional park authority having jurisdiction within the boundaries of the agency, and (c) the State Resources Agency. (Government Code Section 54222)
- 3. Written notice of the availability of the property for purchase must be mailed to any school district in whose jurisdiction the property is located, if the property is suitable for school facilities construction or use by the school district for open space purposes.
- 4. If the property is located within an "enterprise zone" pursuant to Government Code Section 7073, written notice of the availability of the property for purchase must also be mailed to the City of Palm Springs, or the enterprise association or corporation having jurisdiction over the enterprise zone.
- 5. If the property is located within an "infill opportunity zone" or is within an area covered by a "transit village plan," written notice must also be mailed to the City of Palm Springs, or a housing authority within whose jurisdiction the property is located. Should any of the entities identified in paragraphs 2 through 5 wish to purchase or lease the property, the applicable agency must notify the Agency within sixty days of receiving the notice of the proposed sale of the property. If the Agency does not receive a response within sixty days of receipt of the notice, the Agency may dispose of the property to any interested party. If one of the agencies identified in paragraphs 2 through 5 does provide notice of its interest in acquiring the property, the Agency must then enter into good faith negotiations to determine the terms of the purchase or lease of the property. Should the terms not be agreed upon within sixty days, the Agency may then proceed to dispose of the property in any lawful manner. (Government Code Section 54223), (Attachment 4).

If the Agency were to receive more than one offer for the purchase or lease of the property, the law provides that the Agency must give first priority to the entity which agrees to use the site for housing for persons and families of low or moderate income. An exception to that rule provides that first priority must be given to an entity which agrees to use the site for park and recreational purposes if the land is already being used for park or recreational purposes, or if the land is designated for park and recreational use in the County general plan and would be developed for that purpose. (Government Code Section 54227), (Attachment 4).

Staff requests that the Board declare the above-mentioned property as surplus and authorize the General Manager to begin procedures to sell parcels APN 504-133-003 and 004 following notice as required by law.



- (a)As used in this article, the term "local agency" means every city, whether organized under general law or by charter, county, city and county, and district, including school districts of any kind or class, empowered to acquire and hold real property.
- (b)As used in this article, the term "surplus land" means land owned by any local agency, that is determined to be no longer necessary for the agency's use, except property being held by the agency for the purpose of exchange.
- (c)As used in this article, the term "open-space purposes" means the use of land for public recreation, enjoyment of scenic beauty, or conservation or use of natural resources.
- (d)As used in this article, the term "persons and families of low or moderate income" means the same as provided under Section 50093 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (e)As used in this article, the term "exempt surplus land" means either of the following:
- (!) Surplus land that is transferred pursuant to Section 25539.4.
- (2)Surplus land that is (A) less than 5,000 square feet in area, (B) less than the minimum legal residential building lot size for the jurisdiction in which the parcel is located, or 5,000 square feet in area, whichever is less, or (C) has no record access and is less than 10,000 square feet in area; and is not contiguous to land owned by a state or local agency that is used for park, recreational, open-space, or low- and moderate-income housing purposes and is located neither within an enterprise zone pursuant to Section 7073 nor a designated program area as defined in Section 7082. If the surplus land is not sold to an owner of contiguous land, it is not considered exempt surplus land and is subject to this article.
- (f)Notwithstanding subdivision (e), the following properties are not considered exempt surplus land and are subject to this article:
- (1)Lands within the coastal zone.
- (2) Lands within 1,000 yards of a historical unit of the State Parks System.
- (3) Lands within 1,000 yards of any property that has been listed on, or determined by the State Office of Historic Preservation to be eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places.
- (4) Lands within the Lake Tahoe region as defined in Section 669 o 5.5.

ARTICLE 8. Surplus Land (54220 - 54233) (Heading of Article 8 amended by Stats. 1982, Ch. 1442, Sec. 1.)

Any local agency disposing of surplus land shall send, prior to disposing of that property, a written offer to sell or lease the property as follows:

(a) A written offer to sell or lease for the purpose of developing low- and moderate-income housing shall be sent to any local public entity, as defined in Section 50079 of the Health and Safety Code, within whose jurisdiction the surplus land is located. Housing sponsors, as defined by Section 50074 of the Health and Safety Code, shall be sent, upon written request, a written offer to sell or lease surplus land for the purpose of developing low- and moderate-income housing. All notices shall be sent by first-class mail and shall include the location and a description of the property. With respect to any offer to purchase or lease pursuant to this subdivision, priority shall be given to development of the land to provide affordable housing for lower income elderly or disabled persons or households, and other lower income households.

- (b) A written offer to sell or lease for park and recreational purposes or open-space purposes shall be sent:
- (1) To any park or recreation department of any city within which the land may be situated.
- (2) To any park or recreation department of the county within which the land is situated.
- (3) To any regional park authority having jurisdiction within the area in which the land is situated.
- (4) To the State Resources Agency or any agency that may succeed to its powers.
- (c) A written offer to sell or lease land suitable for school facilities construction or use by a school district for open-space purposes shall be sent to any school district in whose jurisdiction the land is located.
- (d) A written offer to sell or lease for enterprise zone purposes any surplus property in an area designated as an enterprise zone pursuant to Section 7073 shall be sent to the nonprofit neighborhood enterprise association corporation in that zone.
- (e) A written offer to sell or lease for the purpose of developing property located within an infill opportunity zone designated pursuant to Section 65088.4 or within an area covered by a transit village plan adopted pursuant to the Transit Village Development Planning Act of 1994 (Article 8.5 (commencing with Section 65460) of Chapter 3 of Division 1 of Title 7) shall be sent to any county, city, city and county, community redevelopment agency, public transportation agency, or housing authority within whose jurisdiction the surplus land is located.
- (f) The entity or association desiring to purchase or lease the surplus land for any of the purposes authorized by this section shall notify in writing the disposing agency of its intent to purchase or lease the land within 60 days after receipt of the agency's notification of intent to sell the land.


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STAFF REPORT TO DESERT WATER AGENCY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

MARCH 19, 2019

RE: FEBRUARY 2019 WATER USE REDUCTION FIGURES

Desert Water Agency and its customers achieved a 29.7% reduction in potable water production during February 2019 compared to the same month in 2013 – the baseline year used by the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) to measure statewide conservation achievements. DWA continues to report its production to the state on a monthly basis, despite mandatory conservation ending in 2017.



DWA is asking its customers to save 10-13% compared to 2013 to help achieve long-term sustainability.

The cumulative savings over the last twelve-month period is 15.75%. The cumulative savings beginning in June of 2016 when we put our 10-13% target in place is 16.76%.



Comments: The Agency's service area is highly seasonal making population analysis a complex task. The State Water Resources Control Board (State Board) analyzes data on a per capita basis.

Historically, DWA has submitted data based on the permanent population of the service area; however, that data does not accurately reflect water use in DWA's service area which has a highly seasonal population. Based on local data, the correct population is higher than previously reported. The Residential Gallons Per Capita Per Day (R-GPCD) is being submitted using the corrected population.

Since Desert Water Agency began recycling water, the agency has reclaimed 99,485 acre feet. If our recycled water production for this month was taken into consideration against our potable production, the conservation achieved would have been several percentage points higher.

Since January 1, there has been approximately 8 MAF of outflow from the Delta. Of that, 930 TAF was exported and 75 TAF was foregone due to lack of demand/storage. See the graph on the following page for additional detail on outflow and exports.

RE: FACILITIES STORM DAMAGE UPDATE

Following a large storm event on February 14, 2019 in the Coachella Valley and surrounding mountains, a historically high volume of water flowed through the normally low flowing streams. All of the Agency's surface water intakes were damaged by the storm run-off. Also, the Agency's Cathedral Canyon Drive 8" dia. force main, developed a leak, spilling sewage into the Whitewater River Channel.

The costs are:

- Cathedral Canyon Force Main: approximately \$14,500 in labor and \$10,000 in material
- Snow Creek Intake: approximately \$4,700 in labor
- Chino West Intake: approximately \$2,750 in labor
- Whitewater Mutual Intake; approximately \$1,300 in labor

Note: There is still more work to be performed at the intakes.

The following is a summary of the damage that occurred:

Snow Creek Intake

The flooding that occurred during the storm filled the Snow Creek diversion pool with rocks and sediment. The intake safety railing was destroyed and the diversion weir suffered minor damage (See Photos 2, 3). The concrete lining the side of the stream channel, below the diversion, was undermined (See Photos 5, 6). Construction crews removed the rock and sediment from the diversion pool and reconstructed the streambed wall with the boulders removed from the diversion pool. The railing, the diversion weir, and the stream channel will be repaired once the winter/spring runoff has subsided.



Falls Creek Bridge Over Snow Creek

The west approach to the Falls Creek Bridge was completely undermined and the east approach was partially undermined (See Photos 1-2). The safety railing on the bridge was destroyed (Photo 3). The Bridge has a wood plank deck supported by I-beams. The bolt/nuts holding the I-Beam spacers vibrated loose, along with many bolt/nuts holding the lumber in place (Photo 4). The mortar that provides bedding for the I-Beams was removed for several I-Beams (Photo 5). The upstream leading I-Beam was deformed by ½" to 1" (See Photo 6). The ½" thick steel cross straps that brace the I-Beams, welded at each I-Beam crossing, were displaced indicating that the bridge shifted (See Photo 7). Agency staff will meet with Krieger and Stewart to determine the best course of action to rehabilitate the Falls Creek Bridge.



Falls Creek Intake

The Falls Creek Intake was severely damaged during the February 14, storm event. A landslide occurred on the road leading to the Fall Creek Intake, covering a large section of the road (See Photo 2). Also, a section of road below the Falls Creek Intake washed away, exposing the 8" Falls Creek Pipeline, thrust block, and electrical conduit and box (See Photos 3-5). The concrete slab adjacent to the intake was undermined or removed by the water and will need to be replaced and boulders were lodged in the intake screen (See Photos 5-8). Agency staff will meet with Krieger and Stewart to determine the best course of action to rehabilitate the Falls Creek Intake. Any remediation will have to be done after the Falls Creek Bridge is repaired.

Chino North Intake (Not currently in use for potable water supply):

A flash flood occurred in the Chino North Drainage. The Chino North Intake was severely damaged during the February 14, storm event (See Photo 2). The footbridge leading to the Chino North Intake was destroyed (See Photo 3). Due to the damage to the road leading up to the Tram, a full assessment of the Chino North Intake has not been done. The Agency plans to meet with Krieger & Stewart to determine the best course of action to rehabilitate the Chino North Intake.

Chino West Intake (PS Tram potable water supply):

The Chino West Drainage was spared during the February 14, storm event. The Chino West Intake filled with sediment and no other major damage occurred. The stream was placed out of service prior to the storm to protect the quality of the water stored in the Tram's Lower Station Reservoir. Unfortunately, due to the damage sustained at the Tram's Lower Station, all the water was drained from the Reservoir, leaving the Station with no water. As the road to the Tram was washed out, access was limited to a helicopter that was made available by the Tram Authority. The Intake was cleaned the week after the storm, and made ready to return to service. Once Agency Operations personnel had 24 hour unrestricted access to the Chino West Intake and Ultraviolet (UV) Facility, waterservice was restored to the Lower Station on March 8. The Tram Authority is waiting for bacteriological test results, as required by the Riverside County Department of Public Health.

Cathedral Canyon Sewer Force Main Break:

On February 19, a Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) occurred east of Cathedral Canyon Drive in the Whitewater River Wash. The Agency was notified at 1:00 p.m. and after confirming that a SSO had occurred, the Agency responded per the Agency's Sanitary Sewer Overflow Response Plan (SSORP).

By 1:40 p.m., the lift station that discharges to the PVC force main was shut down and vacuum trucks transferred the sewage to a point designated by CVWD; the Agency utilized the Agency owned vacuum truck, along with vacuum trucks voluntarily provided by Veolia and CVWD, and hired private pumping trucks to transfer sewage.

Thay day an initial attempt was made to repair the pipe, which proved unsuccessful due to the high water table and flowing surface water; the Agency was unable to dewater the ground to safely make the repair. Also, an attempt was made to temporarily by-pass the broken section of force main, but due to the low pumping pressure of the lift station, that proved unsuccessful. By 8:00pm, it was determined that the best course of action was to continue pumping sewage from the lift station wet well all night and regroup in the morning. A dirt barrier was created around the break area and caution tape was placed to help secured the site overnight.

The following day, February 20, the Agency's Construction Department personnel returned to the wash to find the sub-surface groundwater had subsided and surface water flow had diminished. Crews were able to reinstall 100 feet of force main with ductile iron pipe at a lower depth and at 3:10 p.m., the pipe had been repaired and the lift station was put back in service.

It is estimated that 1,850 to 2,200 gallons of sewage entered the channel. Per the SSORP, the Agency reported the discharge to the Regional Water Quality Control Board.

Whitewater Irrigation Intake and Pipeline

Following a large storm event on February 14, 2019, in the Coachella Valley and surrounding mountains, an abnormal high volume of runoff flowed through the normally low flowing streambeds. The Whitewater River Channel experienced significant erosion. A large portion of the flat area surrounding the Whitewater Irrigation Well in the canyon was eroded. The Agency plans to evaluate the site with Krieger & Stewart to determine the best course of action to protect the wellsite.

During the high flow event, the Whitewater Irrigation concrete pipe just south of the 10 freeway was damaged. The Construction department temporarily fixed the leak. To repair the pipe, a Cure In Place Pipe (CIPP) method (install a fiberglass resin main within the existing concrete pipe) will be

used.
