18952. President Stuart opened the meeting at 8:00 a.m. and asked Pledge of Allegiance everyone to join him in the Pledge of Allegiance.

18954. President Stuart called for approval of the November 3, 2020 Approval of 11/03/20 Regular Board Meeting Minutes. Approval of 11/03/20 Regular Board Mtg. Minutes

18955. President Stuart called upon General Manager Krause to provide Report an update on Agency operations.

Mr. Krause provided an update on Agency operations and noted his meetings and activities for the past several weeks.

Committee Reports 18956. President Stuart noted the minutes for the November 12, 2020 Executive 11/12/20 Executive Committee meeting were provided in the Board's packet.

18957. President Stuart opened the meeting for public comment.

Assistant Secretary of the Board Baca read into the record a letter received from the Sierra Club California regarding Agenda Item 8-A urging the Board not to fund the next phase of the Delta Conveyance (aka the Delta Tunnel) project.

Mr. Amico congratulated Vice President Bloomer on her reelection to the Board of Directors and Mr. Ortega for his appointment to the Board of Directors and thanked staff for their assistance in answering all of his questions.

Mr. Ortega congratulated Vice President Bloomer on her reelection to the Board of Directors and stated he is looking forward to working with the Board.

There being no one else from the public wishing to address the Board, President Stuart closed the public comment period.

18958. President Stuart called upon Secretary-Treasurer Ewing to **Report (October)** present an overview of financial activities for the month of October 2020.

Secretary-Treasurer Ewing reported that the Operating Fund received \$3,753,036 in Water Sales Revenue and \$90,383 in Reclamation Sales Revenue. \$4,060,356 was paid out in Accounts Payable. Year-to-date Water Sales are 8% over budget, Year-to-date Total Revenues are 8% over budget; and Year-to-date Total Expenses are 16% under budget. There were a total of 22,952 active services as of October 31, compared to 22,930 active services as of September 30.

Reporting on the General Fund, Mr. Ewing stated that \$588,427 was received in Property Tax, \$1,627,533 in Groundwater Assessments (\$40,302 from private pumpers and \$1,587,231 from DWA), and \$17,804 from SCE for Whitewater Hydro Power Sales for September 2020. \$767,959 was paid in State Water Project charges (YTD \$7,714,214).

Reporting on the Wastewater Fund, Mr. Ewing reported \$0 was received in Sewer Contract payments. There are a total of 4 Sewer Contracts, 0 paid in full, with total delinquents of 3 (75%) with \$1,002 principal payments remaining. \$85,136 was paid out in Accounts Payable.

18959. President Stuart called upon General Manager Krause to present staff's Request for Authorization to Participate in the Delta Conveyance Project, Execute Funding Agreement and Approve Funding for Planning & Design Costs, Approve Amendments to the Design & Construction Authority Joint Powers Agreement, Approve MOU for Class 8 Election Procedures to DCA Board and Make Determination that the Actions are Exempt from CEQA (Resolution No. 1245)

Mr. Krause reported that on July 21, 2017, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) approved the California WaterFix Project (WaterFix). The Desert Water Agency Board of Directors previously approved participating in WaterFix in the amount of \$2,176,786. He explained that in order to assist DWR with the design and construction of WaterFix and potential financing, certain State Water Project contractors entered in a Joint Powers Agreement in 2018 forming the Delta Conveyance Design and Construction Joint Powers Authority (DCA) and the Delta Conveyance Finance Authority. At the time, the project had approvals under California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Endangered Species Act (ESA), and California Endangered Act (CESA). He went on to state that on January 2019, Governor Newsom announced that he did not support WaterFix configured as two tunnel but that he did support a one tunnel conveyance project. Consistent with this, in May 2019 the Department of Water Resources (DWR) rescinded its approvals of the WaterFix project and began planning for a single tunnel option. Shortly thereafter, DWR began public negotiations with the State Water Project (SWP) public water agencies (PWAs) to agree upon a framework, referred to as an Agreement in Principle (AIP), for the amendment of SWP water supply contracts to allocate costs and benefits in the event that a potential single tunnel facility was ultimately approved. He noted that the AIP will be the basis for a future contract amendment only if a project is ultimately approved and only after necessary environmental review is completed.

Mr. Krause pointed out that in January 2020, DWR released a Notice of Preparation of an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) pursuant to CEQA for a proposed single tunnel project with 6,000 cfs of capacity referred to as the Delta Conveyance Project (DCP). He noted that DWR is currently

conducting environmental review and is relying on the DCA for engineering work related to defining the Project's footprint. He then explained that after fifteen public negotiations, DWR and PWAs developed a draft AIP that contains provisions for the allocation of costs and benefits for a potential Delta Conveyance Project. The draft AIP allows PWAs an option to: 1) execute a contract amendment to participate the Delta Conveyance Project at no less than each PWAs Table A (DWA's percentage is 1.34%) percentage or more, or 2) opt out of the Delta Conveyance Project costs and benefits entirely. He noted that in the draft AIP, there is a table with the names of each SWP contractor and a space to fill in the participation percentage in order to complete the AIP and proceed with the planning and the environmental review efforts related to the Delta Conveyance Project. DWR is asking SWP contractors to fill in the allocation factor table with each PWA's participation percentage assuming a 6,000 cfs facility. Currently, the proposed project is a SWP project only as the CVP has not indicated any interest in pursuing Delta Conveyance at this time. Again, the participation options are zero (opting out), 100% of Table A, and more than 100% of Table A (DWAs proposed participation is 1.52%). This participation percentage will first be used to inform the percentage of planning funding allocated to participating PWAs.

He then reported that upon completing the environmental process, the AIP will be converted into contract amendment language and PWAs will consider an amendment to their contracts consistent with the AIP. At this time, each PWAs participation percentage in the Delta Conveyance Project will be decided. Mr. Krause then explained that DWR is asking that PWAs enter into a new funding agreement to advance their participation percentage of \$340.7 million that is needed for the preliminary design, environmental planning, and other preconstruction activities to assist in the environmental process for the proposed project. The funding agreements provide that PWAs would be reimbursed or receive a credit for the advanced funds upon the first sale of revenue bonds to pay for the Delta Conveyance Project. To the extent the Delta Conveyance Project does not proceed, the advanced funds would not be recovered.

Mr. Krause stated that given the shift from a two tunnel WaterFix project to a potential single-tunnel Delta Conveyance Project and a significant change in the participation for the Delta Conveyance Project, the PWAs have been discussing amendments to the Joint Powers Agreement that created the DCA to better align representation with PWA participation. The proposed amendments would primarily amend the governance structure to align current participation interest in the Delta Conveyance Project. He reported that the DCA JPA amendment added four additional seats to the three member board. Two of the four additional seats are to be selected by the Class 8 Contractors. There are nine member agencies in the Class 8 Contractor group, including DWA. An election process has been developed by the Class 8 Contractor Agency designated representatives for the State

Water Project. The detailed election process is described in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). All Class 8 Contractor Agencies are expected to approve the MOU.

Concluding his report Mr. Krause pointed out that the proposed actions discussed herein do not constitute the approval by Desert Water Agency of the Delta Conveyance Project or its construction, of any amendment to the long term water supply contract with DWR, or to any actions by the DCA that may cause direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect environmental impacts. As such, the actions recommended herein are not a "project" requiring environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act, and if the actions were to be considered a CEQA "project," these actions would be statutorily exempt from environmental review pursuant to CEQA Guidelines 15262 because the actions merely call for the funding and completion and feasibility and planning studies, including the completion of CEQA review itself.

Mr. Krause then presented a Power Point Presentation detailing the overall explanation of the project and agreements previously mentioned.

Staff recommends the Board approve the following actions: 1) Adopt Resolution No. 1245 indicating a level of participation in the Delta Conveyance Project of 1.52% DWA's Table A percentage of the State Water Project water supply is 1.34%, 2) Authorize the General Manager to execute a funding agreement with the Department of Water Resources for environmental planning costs associated with the Delta Conveyance Project in the amount of up to \$1,900,132 (1.52% of \$340.7M) for the first two years. Payment of the project is spread over 4 years. If after 2 years we continue to participate through year 4 our total cost will be \$5,184,310, 3) Authorize the General Manager to execute an amended Delta Conveyance Design and Construction Authority Joint Powers Agreement, 4) Authorize the General Manager to enter into an MOU for Class 8 Member Agencies Election Procedures for DCA Board of Directors, 5) Determining the actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.

RESOLUTION NO. 1245 A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE DESERT WATER AGENCY AUTHORIZING (1) A LEVEL OF PARTICIPATION IN THE DELTA CONVEYANCE PROJECT; (2) THE GENERAL MANAGER TO ENTER INTO A FUNDING AGREEMENT FOR ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNING COSTS FOR THE PROJECT; (3) ENTERING INTO THE DELTA CONVEYANCE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT; AND DETERMINING THAT THE ACTIONS ARE EXEMPT FROM CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT

In response to Director Cioffi, Mr. Krause explained that the additional cost would be for increased reliability and more capacity in the tunnel.

In response to Director Oygar, Mr. Krause indicated this project works well with the water exchange agreement and guarantees the Agency on receiving supplemental water.

Secretary-Treasurer Ewing pointed out that the California WaterFix costs more than the Delta Conveyance Project.

In response to Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Krause indicated that there is a no project alternative and he is not sure how it would be analyzed. Secretary-Treasurer Ewing added that the reliability issue cannot be understated by this project.

In response to President Stuart, Mr. Krause explained the Agency is already doing the alternatives noted in the Sierra Club California letter and pointed out the Agency still needs imported water and noted with projected future growth, the imported water is needed.

18960. President Stuart called upon Finance Director Saenz to present staff's request for Board Approval for Extension of COVID-19 Financial Relief to Customers.

Mrs. Saenz gave an update on the financial impact COVID-19 has had on the Agency. She reported to date, the Agency has experienced lost revenues of \$89,300.00 and a net increase in expenses of \$14,300.00, totaling a net impact of \$103,600.00 when compared to pre COVID-19 anticipated revenue and expenses. She pointed out that one area she is monitoring that has potential negative impact is Accounts Receivable. Accounts Receivable has increased by over \$615,400 as compared to the pre-COVID-19 average. This has decreased by approximately \$300,000 compared to last month which is an improvement. She stated that the Agency will continue to monitor the ongoing revenue losses and expenses related to COVID-19 and will provide ongoing updates to the Board.

Staff will also continue to monitor the ongoing revenue losses and expenses related to COVID-19 and will provide ongoing updates to the Board.

LOBBYING FIRM RETENTION CONTRACT

The following constitutes a lobbying firm retention contract between **REEB GOVERNMENT RELATIONS, LLC** ("RGR" hereinafter), or its legal successor in interest, and **DESERT WATER AGENCY** ("DWA" hereinafter), or its legal successor in interest.

1. SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED— DWA engages the services of RGR as an independent contractor. RGR will provide advice and representation on behalf of DWA on California legislative and regulatory matters. Such services shall include:

- A. Representation in the State Capitol and with the Executive Branch in regard to the 2021-22 Regular Session of the California Legislature.
- B. Research and analysis of state legislative and regulatory issues and related initiatives; drafting legislation and amendments thereto relating to such issues.
- C. Legislative reporting services as may be required by DWA.
- D. Participation and attendance at DWA meetings to discuss current events, tasks under the scope of work and other business related to the governmental relations program. Attendance and participation at other meetings, upon request by DWA, including, but not limited to, meetings related to issues management and formation of lobbying coalitions.

RGR will work under the direction of the General Manager and will coordinate services to be performed with same.

2. TERMS OF PAYMENT— DWA will pay RGR, according to terms and conditions set forth herein, a fee of ONE HUNDRED NINETY-TWO THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$192,000.00) for the period of January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2022. This amount shall be paid in twenty-four (24) equal installments of EIGHT THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$8,000.00) due on the first (1st) of each month from January 2021 through December 2022, inclusive. Payment shall cover all time expended by RGR personnel unless otherwise agreed to by RGR and DWA.

- A. Invoices shall be submitted monthly by RGR for payment by DWA. Payment is past due the next business day following the fifteenth of the month. If DWA has any valid reason for disputing any portion of an invoice, DWA will so notify RGR within seven (7) calendar days of receipt of invoice, and if no such notification is given, the invoice shall be deemed valid. The portion of RGR's invoice that is not in dispute shall be paid in accordance with the procedures set forth herein.
- B. DWA shall reimburse RGR all costs incurred in connection with the services rendered. Reimbursable costs shall include travel costs and other costs approved by the steering committee. Travel costs are defined as air travel, lodging, meals and incidentals, ground transportation, and all costs associated with travel. All travel expenses must receive DWA's prior approval. RGR shall provide to DWA substantiation of reimbursable costs incurred.
- C. A finance charge of 1.5% per month on the unpaid amount of an invoice will be charged on past due accounts. Payments by DWA will thereafter be applied first to accrued interest and then to the principal unpaid balance. Any attorney fees, court costs, or other costs incurred in collection of delinquent accounts shall be paid by DWA. If payment of invoices is not current, RGR may suspend performing further work.

3. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR—It is understood that RGR will function as an independent contractor and will hold itself out as such and will be without authority to obligate DWA for indebtedness, contracts, or other legal obligations.

4. POLITICAL REFORM ACT—RGR will be solely responsible for its filing and reporting obligations pursuant to the Political Reform Act of 1974, as it may be amended from time to time. DWA will be solely responsible for its filing and reporting obligations pursuant to the Political Reform Act of 1974, as it may be amended from time to time.

5. GOVERNING LAW - This agreement shall be governed by and construed pursuant to the laws of the State of California.

6. ENTIRE AGREEMENT - This is the entire agreement of the parties and no other representations, promises or agreements, oral or otherwise, shall be of any force or effect. This agreement may be supplemented, amended or revised only in writing by agreement of the parties.

7. TERM OF CONTRACT—The engagement shall be subject to review at any mutually agreed upon time. Either party may terminate this engagement without cause by giving written notice at least sixty (60) days prior to the date of termination. DWA's obligation to pay any further monthly installments shall cease upon the date of the termination and DWA shall have no further monetary obligation to RGR as of that date of termination. The effective date of this agreement is January 1, 2021, and it shall terminate on December 31, 2022.

RE: PROPOSITION 218 RATE INCREASES AND FUTURE RATE STUDY SCHEDULING

In 2016, Desert Water Agency performed a rate study which resulted in an approved fiveyear rate increase plan beginning January 1, 2017. This plan provided funding for increased pipeline replacements and large maintenance projects in order to address the Agency's aging infrastructure. This plan also phased in increased fixed charges from 17% to 30% of revenues to improve revenue stability for the Agency while still incentivizing conservation.

The fifth and final rate increase in the five-year plan was scheduled to be implemented on July 1, 2020. Due to COVID-19, the Board elected to not implement this rate increase on its planned implementation date of July 1, 2020 but rather to reassess the rate increase potential in six months. In order to balance the 2020/2021 budget without the planned rate increase, the Agency deferred \$3.6 million in capital improvement projects.

The rate increase, as approved through the Prop 218 process, can be approved at any point in time up until June 30, 2021. After this date, any future rate increases will require a new rate study and Prop 218 approval process.

On November 16, 2020, the Finance Committee met to discuss the potential January 1, 2021 rate increase. It was recommended by the Committee to not implement the rate increase effective January 1, 2021 but to re-address the implementation of the fifth and final rate increase in June 2021. A June 2021 implementation would allow for approximately \$4.7 million in increased revenues to support increased pipeline replacements to allow the Agency to begin increasing annual pipeline replacements starting in fiscal year 2021/2022.

The Agency has 56 miles of unlined bare steel pipe to replace, 43% is beyond its expected life cycle (68 years). At the current rate of pipeline replacement it will take 21 years to replace all 56 miles of pipe and by the end of that 21 year period the pipelines will have also aged an additional 21 years, resulting in an average pipeline age of 89 years. This introduces a significant risk that pipeline leaks and failures may escalate to a critical level. Accelerating the amount of pipeline replaced annually is recommended to reduce this risk. However, water rates must support this proposed increase. Future increased pipe

failures may leave us no other choice than to make an increased financial investment in pipeline replacement.

After June 30, 2021, any future rate increases will require a new rate study and Prop 218 process. This year long process to solicit and select a vendor, perform the rate study and undergo the Prop 218 hearing process may not be agreeable to the community considering the current economic state as a result of COVID-19. The potential of delaying the rate study and Prop 218 process was discussed with the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee recommended to pursue the rate study to determine if the need exists to undergo a Prop 218 proceeding to approve a future rate increase plan, or to hold off and update the rate study at a later date to then pursue the adopting of a rate increase plan through the Prop 218 process.


- (a) Prepared pursuant to DWR's commitment to FERC following spillway event

- (g) Design has been initiated for some recommended interim measures


(h) The needs assessment is a process that will also look at other SWP facilities (Castaic Dam, for example).

- (e) Long term projections: dryer than average








Northern Sierra Precipitation: 8-Station Index, November 18, 2020
