19048. President Bloomer called upon General Manager Krause to Report provide an update on Agency operations.

General Manager's

Mr. Krause provided an update on Agency operations and noted his meetings and activities for the past several weeks.

> **Committee Reports** Executive 02/11/21

19049. President Bloomer noted the minutes for the February 11, 2021 Executive Committee meeting were provided in the Board's packet.

> Secretary-Treasurer's Report (January)

19050. President Bloomer called upon Secretary-Treasurer Stuart to present an overview of financial activities for the month of January 2021.

Operating Fund

Secretary-Treasurer Stuart reported that the Operating Fund received \$2,839,030 in Water Sales Revenue, \$45,619 in Reclamation Sales Revenue, and \$7,004 from SCE for Snow Creek Hydro Power Sales for December 2020. \$3,037,149 was paid out in Accounts Payable. Year-to-date Water Sales are 3% over budget, Year-to-date Total Revenues are 2% over budget; and Year-to-date Total Expenses are 12% under budget. There were a total of 22,993 active services as of January 31, compared to 22,988 active services as of December 31.

General Fund

Reporting on the General Fund, Mr. Stuart stated that \$12,789 was received in Property Tax Receipts, \$1,247,634 in Groundwater Assessments (\$1,177,047 from DWA, \$70,587 from Private Pumpers), \$5,657,644 in Property Tax and \$57,386 from SCE for Whitewater Hydro Power Sales for December 2020. \$3,427,904 was paid in State Water Project charges (YTD \$13,546,859).

Wastewater Fund

Reporting on the Wastewater Fund, Mr. Stuart reported \$26,900 was received in Sewer Capacity Charges from Jones Cree Ventures, \$53 was received in Sewer Contract payments. There are a total of 4 Sewer Contracts, 0 paid in full, with total delinquents of 4 (100%) with \$844 principal payments remaining. \$102,026 was paid out in Accounts Payable.

Public Comment

19051. President Bloomer opened the meeting for public comment.

Mr. Freedman

Mr. Grasha made it clear that all comments made during the DWA Board meetings are on his own behalf and not the Board he sits on and that he plans on sharing more comments in the future.

There being no one else from the public wishing to address the Board, President Bloomer closed the public comment period.

19052. President Bloomer called upon Assistant General Manager Johnson to present staff's request for Acceptance of Construction of Snow Creek Village Surface Water Filtration Plant.

Items for Action: Request Board Acceptance of Construction of Snow Creek Village Surface Water Filtration Plant

Mr. Johnson reported that the 2018/2019 General Fund Capital Improvement Budget included Work Order 18-101-M for design and construction of the Snow Creek Village Filtration Plant in the amount of \$2,300,000.00 (including project engineering, overheads, construction and inspection). He noted that when the project was awarded, the Board authorized a budget augmentation in the amount of \$1,000,000, increasing the overall budget to \$3,300,000.00. Mr. Johnson reported that Cora Constructors, Inc. was awarded the contract on July 16, 2019 with a contract completion date of May 1, 2020 and a State mandated operational date of June 12, 2020. He then explained that due to COVID-19, the construction was slowed and a new contract completion date of August 20, 2020 was approved and a new operational date of September 12, 2020 was also approved by the Division of Drinking Water (Division). He noted that on July 13, 2020, the Contractor performed a successful test run of the plant, with the results submitted to the Division as part of the permit application to serve treated surface water. The Division approved the test run results, however, they required that a new water monitoring station be installed prior to the water entering the distribution system. He pointed out that with this last minute revision, the Division granted an additional 30 days to the plant operational date. After the installation of a new monitoring sample station within the Snow Creek Village by Agency personnel, the plant became officially operational on October 7, 2020.

Mr. Johnson reported that the total estimated charges for the Snow Creek Village Surface Water Filtration Plant construction project are approximately \$3,316,000 (including project engineering, overheads, construction and inspection). There were a total of seven change orders noting that Contract Change Order No. 7 is still under review. The change order has been delayed due to complications in negotiating with the contractor, with the maximum cost to the Agency is approximately \$45,000. He noted that to date, no stop notices have been filed with the Agency. At this time, staff recommends that the Board Accept Construction of Snow Creek Village Surface Water Filtration Plant in the amount of \$2,438,791.80 with the maximum amount not to exceed \$2,483,791.18 following final review of Change Order No. 7. Subsequent to Board acceptance, and acceptance of

Change Order No. 7, the Agency will release retained funds to Cora Constructors, Inc.

19053. President Bloomer called upon Assistant General Manager Johnson to provide a report on the January Water Use Reduction Figures.

Discussion Items:January Water Use
Reduction Figures

Mr. Johnson reported that the Agency and its customers achieved a 4% reduction in potable water production compared to the same month in 2013.

19054. President Bloomer called upon Agency Counsel Riddell to provide a report on the January 21, 2021 Board of Directors of the State Water Contractors meeting.

01/21/2021 SWC Mtg.

Mr. Riddell provided a report on the following items; 1) Closed Session, 2) SWP Management Report, 3) Water Operations Report, and 4) Legislative Update.

In response to Director Ortega, Mr. Riddell explained the climate resiliency bond is a bill that will provide funds for green energy projects.

Vice President Cioffi requested that Lobbyist Reeb be notified of the climate resiliency bill and perhaps Mr. Reeb could report back to the Board.

19055. President Bloomer called upon General Manager Krause to provide his report on the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) Overview.

Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) Overview

General Manager Krause reported that in September of 2020, the Agency was contacted by David Hardy, Project Manager for an 80-unit single family project at the corner of Palm Canyon and Gene Autry Trail. He has sent inquiries since that time about the Agency adopting a resolution to join the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) that enables developers to pay most impact fees and finance public improvements through an acquisition agreement that qualify under the 1913/1915 Act (excluding school fees) via tax-exempt bond issuance proceeds. The SCIP program has

assisted communities and developers throughout California to finance over \$750 million in impact fees and public infrastructure since 2003. He noted that this program has been molded to the needs of each local agency participant of SCIP. He explained that as with most local agencies like Desert Water Agency, developers are required to pay impact fees prior to obtaining project approval. SCIP can be used to directly prepay these fees or, alternatively, to reimburse the developer after fee payment. The program can be used to enable developers to pay for, or be reimbursed for, all eligible impact fees or for a single impact fee. He noted that SCIP has been designed to minimize local agency staff involvement by using an experienced team of finance professionals to administer the program thereby freeing valuable local agency resources for other functions. Mr. Krause pointed out that to participate, a local agency need only be a member of the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) and pass a resolution approving the program. He noted that Mr. Hardy provided a summary of Fees/ Public Improvement to be financed through SCIP for the Canyon View Development. He added that Agency Counsel Riddell and Mr. Hardy are available to answer any legal questions that the Board may have regarding Agency participation in this program. Staff is requesting discussion on its interest in pursuing participation and direction on how to proceed.

Discussion Items: (Cont.) Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) Overview

Agency Counsel Riddell provided an overview of how SCIP works and voiced risks and concerns he has on top of the pluses that Mr. Krause explained earlier; 1) Some loss of control by becoming a member of a SCIP over which Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) are formed and where they're formed and how they are administered, 2) Because the fees have been assigned to a JPA some fees may be funded by CFDs that are funding other expenses as well, 3) Loss of control over the size of the bond issue.

Mr. Hardy who represents the developer introduced himself and encouraged the Board to pursue joining SCIP program.

Mr. Hamill with CSCDA introduced himself and answered Mr. Riddell's concerns and indicated he is available to answer questions.

In response to Director Ortega, Mr. Hardy explained the homeowner will eventually pay the fees over a 30-year amortization. He noted that SCIP was submitted to the City of Palm Springs in 2018 which the city council did review and approve and now the developer is waiting to give DWA a chance to adopt a resolution to enroll in SCIP.

In response to Director Oygar, Mr. Riddell explained that SCIP is a way of financing public infrastructure and he noted he is not aware of any issues regarding SCIP. Further, Mr. Hamill indicated that they take a conservative approach and have had zero lawsuits.

In response to Secretary-Treasurer Stuart, Mr. Krause stated he has not spoken with General Manager Barrett at CVWD regarding SCIP.

Discussion Items: (Cont.) Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) Overview

Vice President Cioffi indicated he would like Mr. Krause and Mr. Riddell to bring back a report regarding Agency liability and he would like Mr. Krause to contact Mr. Barrett and the City of Palm Springs to get feedback and their experience with SCIP.

In response to President Bloomer, Mr. Hardy explained the project has been approved and they are waiting on Riverside County Flood Control to move forward with the project.

In conclusion, Mr. Krause indicated he will follow up with requests to get additional information and report back to the Board.

President Bloomer called upon General Manager Krause to 19056. provide his Power Point Presentation on the 2020 Capital Improvement Projects.

2020 Capital Improvement Projects (PPT)

Mr. Krause provided a PowerPoint presentation on the 2020 Capital Improvement projects which included; 1) Pipeline Projects, 2) Reservoir Maintenance, 3) New Facilities, 4) Safety and 5) Vehicles & Equipment.

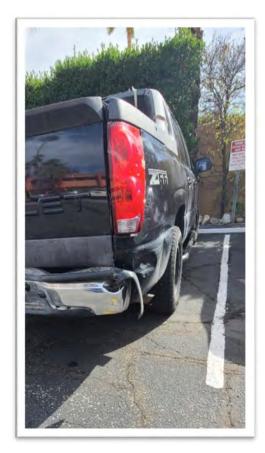

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT MARCH 2, 2021

Damaged Fire Hydrant (725 San Lorenzo Rd.)

On February 13 at approximately 1:17 p.m., Construction stand-by responded to a hit fire hydrant located near the intersection of S. Camino Real and E. Mesquite Ave. The hydrant is still out of service for repairs. The water loss was from a 3-inch hole, which ran for approximately 30 minutes. A police report was filed.





Damaged Fire Hydrant (Calle El Segundo/Ramon Rd.)

On February 16 at approximately 3:00 a.m., Construction stand-by responded to a hit fire hydrant. The hydrant is located on the west side of Calle El Segundo, north of Ramon Rd. The water loss was from a 6-inch fire hydrant bury which ran for approximately 2 1/2 hours. Staff had trouble isolating the fire hydrant valve due to debris in the valve can. The hydrant is back in service and a police report was filed.

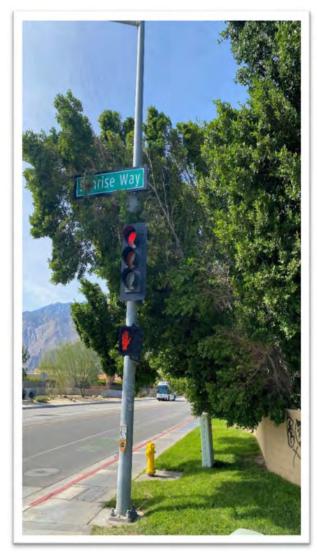




Well #27 Landscape Damage

On the weekend of February 13th a wind storm passed through Palm Springs and caused severe landscape damage onsite and near Well Site #27 (Sunrise Way/San Rafael). A microburst in the storm uprooted large ficus trees and caused them to partially fall toward the public right of way creating a public safety concern. The irrigation system was also damaged. The irrigation system was repaired and the damaged ficus hedge was cut out of the public right of way.

The massive root ball was cut loose and removed from the property by Down to Earth Landscaping and Pompa Tree Service. Other sites impacted by the windstorm were PS North Reservoir, and Chino Reservoir. Down to Earth is cleaning up those sites.

ADA Ramp Rail Project

During a recent ACWA / JPIA property inspection, it was pointed out that DWA's ADA ramp leading up to Warehouse 2 was in need of safety railing.

The Agency contracted Hoffman Steel Fabrication to design, build, and install ADA regulation specific railing, bringing our ramp into compliance with ADA regulations. Project total was

\$12,500.00.





Salt and Nutrient Management Plan Update (Monitoring Workplan)

The Coachella Valley Salt and Nutrient Management Planning Agencies submitted their monitoring workplan to the Regional Water Board on December 23, 2020. The Regional Water Board has announced it acceptance of the plan. The first annual groundwater monitoring plan implementation progress report is due to the Regional Water Board by March 31, 2022.

The plan has a 6-year implementation window with a cost estimate of \$4.1 million dollars which includes sampling and analysis of private wells (\$260,000), and filling of gaps in the monitoring network. The filling of gaps will require the construction of approximately 23 new monitoring wells (\$3.8 million). Approximately two of the shallow groundwater monitoring data gaps fall within the boundaries of the Agency. Funding and allocation of the costs has not yet been determined amongst the participating Agencies.

Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) Update

As directed by the Board at our last meeting, staff has contacted other local governments to learn about their experience participating in the SCIP program.

CVWD states that they were requested to join by developers. CVWD did not see a downside. They do not see a risk to CVWD if the developer should default in repayment. It allows developers to finance the connection fees for projects. They have processed one small development using SCIP and it went well. They received the connection fees up front and did not have to make any changes to their normal process.

The City of Palm Springs stated that it is a simple way to get all of the development impact fees up front rather than over a long period of time. Bonding pays these fees with the future residents paying the bonds off through taxes. The City has ZERO liability – the state is responsible for levying and administering the assessments.

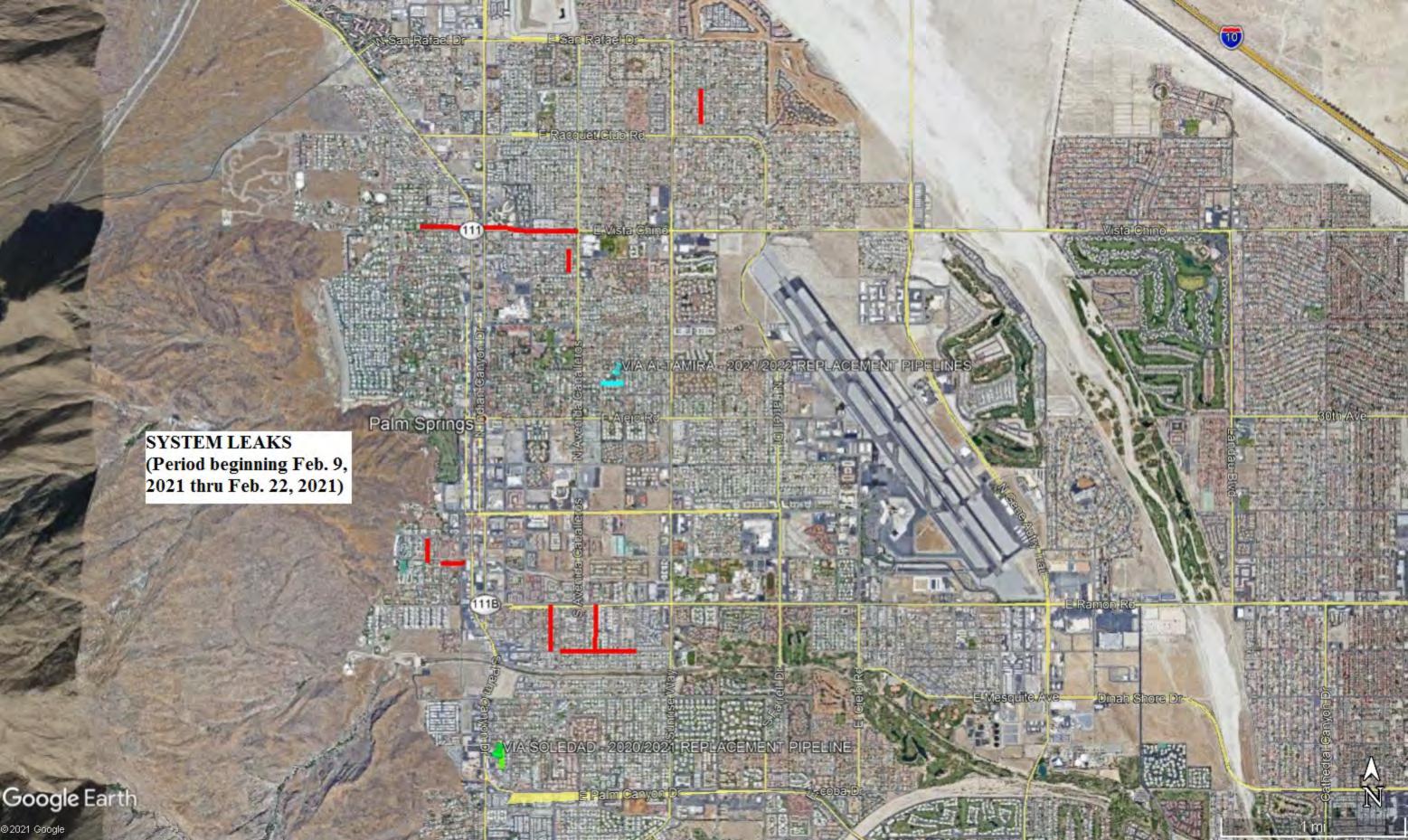
