DWA offers a variety of incentives on grass removal, smart controllers, water efficient nozzles, Energy Star washing machines and more.

These incentives in many cases cover the cost of water efficient upgrades.

These programs are a great way to help save water and money during drought and beyond.

In 2022, customers turned up their water efficiency efforts with our incentives. Many properties also skipped overseeding.

Thanks for a great 2022. Let's continue to work together and resolve to make 2023 even more water wise. Incentive funds are still available.



INCENTIVES: YEAR IN REVIEW

(Data is from Jan. 1, 2022 through mid-December)



Smart Controllers: Customers have installed 82 smart controllers. DWA provides residents up to \$150 for the device & \$100 for install; commercial and HOA properties get up to \$10,000 for devices & \$750 for installation.



Efficient nozzles: Customers have installed 7,096 precision nozzles or fixed bubbler heads. We provide up to \$5 per nozzle & \$2 each for installation.



Grass Removal: DWA processed 368 applications to transform 1,254,872 square feet of grass to water efficient landscaping. DWA provides \$3 a square foot to replace grass with drought friendly plants or artificial turf. Funding amount varies by location and income status but currently ranges from \$3 to \$8 per square foot. Grass must be present when applying.



Washing machines: Customers have installed 103 Energy Star washing machines. We provide up to \$250 for Energy Star washing machines, which use about 33 % less water than regular washers and 25 % less energy. One washer per home.



Business Toilets: Businesses have applied for/installed 100 water efficient toilets. We provide business properties with between 10 -100 free, high-efficiency toilets.

GET TO KNOW YOUR DWA BOARD

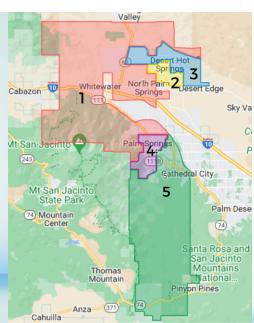

How much water is lost when a car hits a hydrant?

Water loss from a hit hydrant varies depending on the type of hydrant, how bad the damage is and how long it takes to fix the hydrant. During a recent incident after a car hit a hydrant and knocked it off, water flowed for about 25 minutes. This resulted in about 230,000 gallons of lost water - which is enough water to fill more than 12 pools.



DWA WORK CREWS GET AHEAD OF LEAKS

If you see a DWA work crew in your neighborhood, they may be replacing a water service line.

Service lines are 1- or 2-inch pipes that connect the main water pipes in the streets to a customer's water meter. Many service lines installed during the 80s were made of plastic and now have a high failure rate.

To avoid catastrophic failure which may cause major damage to the roads and property, DWA is taking a proactive approach to replacing these pipes before they fail. Over the past three years, DWA has replaced 2,613 or 50 percent of all plastic service lines and has many more planned for 2023. The goal is to get rid of all plastic services by the end of 2027.



We coordinate these replacements with HOAs and neighborhoods on an ongoing basis. We update customers via Nextdoor or through the HOA management company.

It's all part of making sure your water service continues to be reliable.
